Celebrating Earth Day - Taking a look at the significance
of plants and their role in the environment.

Science

Plant Life and Ecosystems:

The lesson highlights the significance of plants and their role in the environment, as students engage in the hands-on activity of creating seed bombs to promote plant growth and ecological balance.

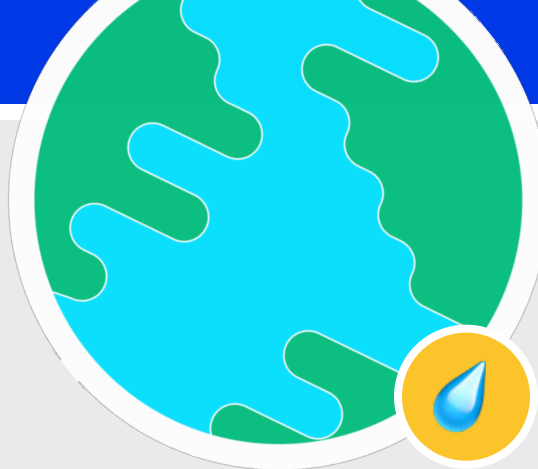

Lesson:



Introduction

Begin the lesson by asking students if they have heard of Earth Day. Allow a few students to share their prior knowledge or experiences.

Explain that Earth Day is a special day celebrated worldwide to promote awareness and appreciation for the Earth's environment.

Introduce the show "Earth Day Celebration Around the World! Nikki Wiki" and explain that you will be watching an episode that showcases Earth Day celebrations in different countries.

Viewing the episode:

Play the Kidoodle.TV episode Nikki's Wiki "Earth Day Celebration Around the World!" for the class.

Encourage students to pay attention to the different countries, cultures, and traditions featured in the episode.

Discussion:

After watching the episode, lead a class discussion to reflect on what the students observed and learned. Ask students to share the countries and traditions they saw in the episode.

Use a world map or globe to locate and discuss the countries mentioned in the episode.

Ask questions to encourage critical thinking, such as:

- *Why do you think Earth Day is celebrated differently in different countries?*
- *What are some ways people in the episode showed care and respect for the environment?*
- *How can we apply what we learned from these celebrations in our own lives?*

NEXT: Do the Seed Bomb activity on the next page before continuing on to the conclusion.

Conclusion:

Gather the students back together and have each group share their experiences and reflections on creating the seed bombs. Emphasize the importance of the seed bombs as symbols of their commitment to taking care of the Earth.

Discuss where and when the students can plant the seed bombs to make a positive impact on their environment. Collect the remaining seed bombs and distribute them to students to take home and plant in suitable locations. Provide each student with a Seed Bomb label (provided).

Extension:

Encourage students to observe and document the growth of the plants from their seed bombs, either through drawings, photographs, or a gardening journal. Discuss the importance of taking care of the planted areas by watering and weeding them regularly.

Seed Bomb Activity:



Begin by discussing plants and their importance in our environment. Explain to the students that they will be engaging in a hands-on activity to create seed bombs. **Introduce the concept of seed bombs** as a way to plant seeds in places that need more plants, such as urban areas or schoolyards. **Explain that seed bombs are small balls** made of a mixture of clay, compost, and seeds, that can be thrown or placed in various locations to help plants grow.

Divide the class into small groups and provide each group with the necessary materials: recycled paper or construction paper, flower or herb seeds, water, blender or food processor, large mixing bowl, cookie cutters or molds, tray or baking sheet, wax paper or parchment paper.

Guide the students through the following steps:

- Tear or cut the recycled paper into small pieces and place them in the mixing bowl.
- Add water to the bowl and let the paper soak for a few minutes until it becomes soft.
- Once the paper is soft, help the students blend or process it in a blender or food processor until it becomes a pulp.
- Have each student take a handful of the wet paper pulp and squeeze out any excess water.
- Add a small handful of seeds to the pulp and mix them thoroughly. Ensure the seeds are evenly distributed.
- Encourage the students to shape the mixture into small balls or use cookie cutters or molds to create different shapes.
- Place the seed bombs on a tray or baking sheet lined with wax paper or parchment paper.

While the seed bombs dry, facilitate a discussion among the groups about the importance of the activity and how it connects to Earth Day.

Assessment:

Assess students' engagement and participation throughout the activity, including their contribution to the group discussions and their efforts in creating the seed bombs.

Monitor their understanding of Earth Day and its global significance through their responses during the discussion sessions.

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
